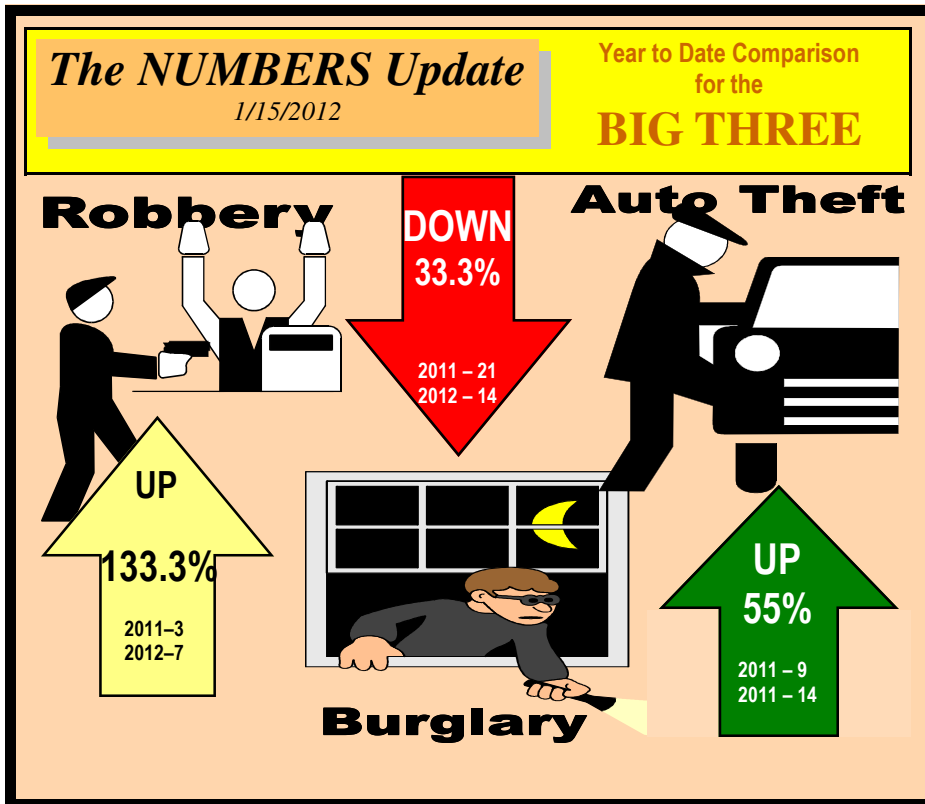

## Officer of the Month

### December 2011

## Off. Gregory Pawelczyk

was chosen for his outstanding performance. During the month it was quite evident that Off. Pawelczyk stood head and shoulders above the rest of the members assigned to the shift. He showed a good grasp of the "big picture" and thought beyond the details of the job to perform miraculously. His initiatives and outputs were beyond exceptional in terms of the quantity and quality of his work. He proactively patrolled his assigned areas giving particular attention to and frequently re-checking locations where crime hazards were great. In so far as possible, he did not patrol his area(s) according to any fixed or scheduled routine but alternating frequently and backtracking in order to be at locations when least expected.

While some officers favor working on particular cases, Off. Pawelczyk is not afraid to branch out and spread his wings working on the most difficult of assignments/cases. The below listed cases will highlight some of the fundamental police work that was performed by Officer Pawelczyk during the month that was a product of self-initiated activities designed at thwarting criminal activity.

- ◆ Off. Pawelczyk led the squad by issuing 53 pieces of traffic enforcement, including 5 traffic related arrests. Additionally, he was the squad's leader in criminal enforcement by clearing 13 cases, and making 6 physical arrests, including 1 search & seizure warrant involving a particular violent crime committed by a son on his mother.
- ◆ Successfully handled a call involving a son who was holding his mother and prized possession show dog valued at a couple of thousand of dollars in the house with a handgun and threatening them with bodily harm. Off. Pawelczyk showing his maturity and experience took charge of the situation. In securing the residence the discovery in plain view marijuana and a digital scale occurred. Subject arrested without incident. A search warrant was obtained for the residence and as a result two handguns, additional marijuana, ammunition and a large amount of U.S. Currency were found in the residence. This case typifies the type of work this officer does on a continual basis.
- ◆ Successfully handled a call at a private school involving a subject with a gun. Again he used his train, knowledge and experience to place the school in lockdown, obtained details, form an active shooter team, and entered the school to locate the subject. The weapon was later found to be a silver air-soft gun.
- ◆ Handled a severe child abuse report, worked to get the child in foster care and obtained warrant and arrested father.
- ◆ Located a suspicious subject who had fled from Federal Officers at the Social Security complex thru conscientious patrol. Off. Pawelczyk positively identify the subject an arrest him for a violent out of state extraditable warrant through New York. Off. Pawelczyk's attentiveness to duty and his decision to take immediate actions(s) had a significant impact on catching this fleeing felon.

Off. Pawelczyk's keen observation skills and his immediate attention exemplify the dedication and commitment that should set the standard for others to follow. His aggressive and quick patrol responses are key components in maintaining safe neighborhoods throughout the Woodlawn Community. The actions of this officer is worthy of special recognition and praise for his exemplary performance of duty.

“I wanted to give a special thanks to our PCR group for setting up the Christmas Holiday decorations in our Precinct. We had one of the best looking lobbies in the county. Moreover, I want recognize all of our active community members for their continued support and partnership to keep our community safe. We can not effectively fight and deter crime without the support of you, the community.

Last year, our crime numbers were higher than I would have liked to see. In this new year, our goal is **communication** and **focused Patrol**. Better communication between the police and the community groups to catch our criminals and prevent crime. Properly focusing our patrol officers in the locations necessary to fight and prevent crimes from occurring in our communities. Our goal should be to **stay ahead** of the crime trends, not chase them. I would like to celebrate at the end of 2012 with significantly lower crime rates than last year as a result of a concerted effort between the police and the community.

We have had some recent success stories:

- ◆ The person that was committing the bank Robberies in the Wilkens and Woodlawn areas has been caught.
- ◆ Three Robberies in the Englewood area has been cleared and four people have been arrested. We have not had any Robberies since the arrest of these for subjects.
- ◆ The Gwynn Oak Burglaries have stopped since the arrest of a two subjects and we have cleared several cases from these arrest.
- ◆ The Hearldry Square Burglaries have also stopped after the arrest of the Gwynn Oak burglars.

There have been recent **auto thefts** where people have **left the keys in their cars while warming up** their engines in the morning. Please either sit in your car while it's warming up or actively watch your car, so no one will jump in and drive off. (SEE HANDOUT PAGE 11.12)

The citizens' academy is starting on Tuesday **March 6, 2012**. This is a great way to learn how the police do their jobs, explore our latest technologies, and promote a more cohesive relationship with the police officers. I would love to see great representation from the community in our precinct, so complete your applications immediately.

In both cases a male suspect **approached a female victim as she was near her vehicle in front of her home.** The suspect displayed a **silver handgun** and took the victim's purse, wallet and cell phone.

# Guest Speaker Summary

## Jay Ringold

### “Emergency Preparedness”

Jay Ringold is a Fire Specialist and works for the Baltimore County Fire Department. He is a spokesman for the Fire Department and is also in charge of the Emergency Operations Center where he monitor the county and is on site for all snowstorms and other types of weather related emergencies. He works along with FEMA and MEMA. When the Emergency Operations Center is in operation he utilizes all local resources and works with agencies across the county as needed. **His #1**

**PIECE OF ADVICE.....IS IN THE BOX BELOW.** This should NOT just be something they say on newscast when a storm is pending; it should be something everyone does.

He advised that Baltimore County is a “resource rich” county, but in a disaster they cannot get to everyone right away.....and remember you are not first on the list.

Fire Specialist Ringold advised that an Emergency Preparedness training course called **Neighbors helping Neighbors** should be available in the county starting in May. He highly recommends it and will provided dates and times to be advertised in the ANGEL CRIER when they are available.

#### Neighbors Helping Neighbors: Emergency Preparedness for Citizens

The latest chapter in Baltimore County's ongoing emergency preparedness effort involves teaching citizens how to help themselves and their neighbors during and immediately after a disaster.

The county invites residents to participate in the "Neighbors Helping Neighbors," an all-hazards program designed to teach people the skills required to get through the first, critical 72 hours following an emergency.

To learn more about participating in this program, visit our online volunteer resource. You may register online for this program.

"Neighbors Helping Neighbors" is a multi-part program. Participants may attend all or some of the sections -- though they must participate in at least three classes in order to become certified in CPR and first aid.

These are printed for networking purposes in case others have the same questions, concerns, etc.

- ◆ Dumpster diving is NOT illegal.
- ◆ Speed camera location is determined by preset wawvik Chief of Police – per Councilman Tom Quirk's office..... a new contract should be in affect soon
- ◆ School buses – you **MUST** stop in both direction if undivided road (i.e. Liberty Rd). There is a \$520 fine and 5 pt for violation for passing a stopped school bus with flashing red lights – if you witness a violation; get tag and description of vehicle and **description of driver** (*very important*) in addition to time and place of violation and info. on the bus, so the police can follow up. Just a reminder.....the driver is issued the citation, NOT the car.



- ◆ **Neighborhood Watch** – To form one based on the national program with the signs a very high % of homeowners must participate to be sanctioned – Community Resource officers can help get this organized if you are interested

**Unattended Cars Could Leave You With A Ticket**

Citizens are reminded to never leave their car alone with the motor running. It is a perfect opportunity for a thief and also against the law. At least five vehicle owners have had their vehicles stolen after leaving their keys in the ignition just in the past week.

**Leaving Keys in the Ignition Can Leave You Out in the Cold . . . and Car Thieves Warm in Your Car**

*Baltimore County, Md. (January 12, 2012)* - As the weather turns colder, Baltimore County Police would like to remind drivers not to leave vehicles unattended with the engines running and keys in the ignition.

In the past week alone, at least five vehicle owners have had their vehicles stolen when they left the keys in the ignition with the engine running. Vehicles left running outside homes, in front of convenience stores, and at gas pumps present an easy target for car thieves. Drivers should always take their keys with them and secure their vehicles, even for a very short trip into the store. Drivers may want to leave vehicles running to warm up their engines, but should never leave the vehicle unattended while doing so. **It's the Law** In addition to the increased risk of vehicle theft, leaving a vehicle alone with the engine running is against the law. Officers can issue a ticket that is accompanied by a \$70 fine and one point against your driving record if they see an unattended car.

Unattended, running vehicles also pose a safety hazard. If the vehicle slips out of gear and causes an accident, you could be issued a ticket with a \$110 fine and three points against your driving record.

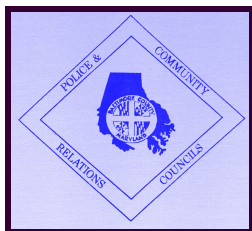
